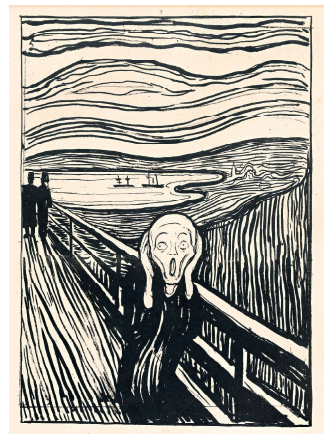
1 *The eggstra MILE*

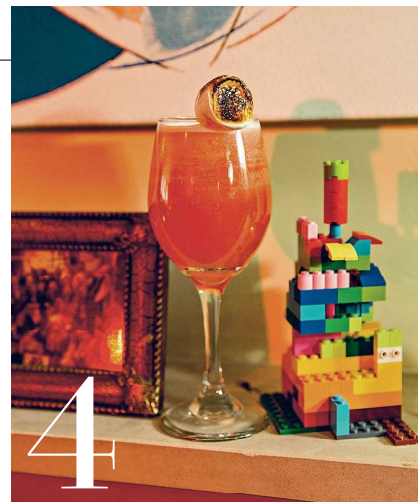
6 MUNCH OBLIGED
